

Ovid Library to Host Local Author for Signing and Women's Book Club Event

Ovid – Nearly forty percent of American adults are obese, and Jon Stanton is one of them. The former Carland and Ovid resident has struggled with obesity most of his life, “I was already wearing adult-sized clothes in third grade,” he said, and now he’s written a book about what it’s like to grow up and live as a fat man. Stanton will be signing books on Tues., Jan. 14 from 3:30-5:30 p.m. and again from 6:30-8 p.m. at the Ovid Public Library, 206 N. Main St. He will also speak to the Women’s Book Club about the writing process from 5:30-6:30 p.m. The book is \$12 for a single copy or two copies for \$20. For those unable to attend, the book is available from amazon.com via Stanton’s website, www.hopefortheheavy.com.



“FAT: A Life Unfiltered” is a frank portrayal into the life of the obese, but with an emphasis on more humorous experiences of being overweight. “When you’re more than 100 pounds overweight for most of your life, funny things happen to you that don’t happen to thin people or even people who are just slightly overweight,” Stanton said. “It also affects your worldview, the decisions you make, how you form relationships – almost everything about your life is impacted in some way.”

Stanton said he wanted to keep most of the book humorous because laughter opens people’s hearts, allowing them to feel the pain and shame the extremely obese experience without being overwhelmed. The entire book isn’t funny, though. “I took time to discuss what goes on in our heads,” he said. “Nearly everyone I know who is as big as I am struggles with low self-esteem and negative self-talk, as well as denial. I couldn’t leave those things out of the narrative.”

Stanton has been as heavy as 430 pounds and as light as 200 pounds, within just a couple years of each other. From 2007-2009, he lost 230 pounds through eating better and exercising regularly, and he kept the weight off for over three years. He completed two half-marathons, a century ride (100 miles in one day) on his bike and appeared on NBC’s “Today” and the “700 Club” to tell his success story to others who struggle with weight. He also won the Governor’s Fitness Award from former Michigan Governor Jennifer Granholm.

“Those were some of the best years of my life. I was speaking to groups regularly about healthy living, I met and married my wife, I was riding my bike 3,000 miles annually and felt great. But old demons are hard to keep at bay forever, and unfortunately, I eventually gained back more than 100 of those pounds.”

That, Stanton said, is why he wrote the book. “Battling weight all the time, especially in our food-saturated culture, is exhausting. I want to encourage people who have struggled, let them know they aren’t alone, and try to help people who have never struggled understand we aren’t just lazy, unmotivated creatures with no willpower.”

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

A Pastor's Perspective

Foundations for a Successful Life

Last week we started a series concerning the meaning and purpose of life. We likened life to a jig saw puzzle and our circumstances to the pieces that must fit together to form the overall picture. We saw that the task becomes less confusing, less frustrating when we realize what life is really supposed to look like. Seeing "The Big Picture" enables us to fit our circumstances into a logical and reasonable pattern that can bring purpose and peace in spite of, not because of, circumstances. Having these "pieces" fitted properly together, whatever they may look like individually, becomes a life well lived – a truly successful life. In the weeks ahead I would like for us to consider this "Big Picture" of life, seeing what it should look like and perhaps why the pieces haven't fit together for us in the past.

The "Big Picture", the thing that the circumstances of our life fit into, the thing that causes them to make sense is called our "worldview." It's the bottom line of what we perceive to be truth. The problem is that my worldview may, or may not, reflect the truth. Truth is not what I create with my mind, or what I dream up, but facts as they actually are. So, if we are to get the pieces of life to fit together accurately, if we are to live the successful life, it is imperative that we recognize truth and live in conformity to it. Living in reality is living in accord with the truth. Dr. Neil Anderson says it like this; "Everybody believes in something and everybody lives according to what they believe to be true, but if what we believe isn't true, then how we live won't be right."

I once asked a 21-year-old man what his plans and goals for life were. He said that his intentions were to attend the University of Notre Dame on a football scholarship and then play in the N.F.L. He had failed to graduate from high school, was about 5'- 9 in. in height, weighed about 150 pounds and had never played organized football. He was believing something that wasn't true, and his life has demonstrated it. "Make believe" always catches up with us sooner or later. Now this is an extreme example, but how many times do we fail to live in reality?

Perhaps we are like another young man that I read of in a short story. This story took place in the late 19th century. He was a traveling salesman and while in Memphis he received a telegram from his mother-in-law saying that his wife was in labor for their first child, it wasn't going well, and that he needed to return home as soon as possible. Just as he boarded the train another telegram arrived. He looked at it for some time without reading it and then stepped out between cars, tore it into small pieces and scattered them in the wind. He returned to his seat and began to tell others that his wife had just delivered their first child, a boy and that both were doing well. He was congratulated by them and was cheerful for the remainder of the trip, but upon arriving at the train station he was met by those who informed him that both his wife and the baby had died in childbirth. Sometimes we lie to ourselves or hide from the truth in order to save our emotions, but truth and reality always catch up with us. To experience a successful life, it is imperative that it be based upon these two foundations. Therefore, our goal must be to discover truth and live in the light of reality.



Social Security Expands Public Hours at Offices Nationwide

Starting on January 8, 2020, Social Security offices nationwide will be open to the public on Wednesday afternoons, Andrew Saul, Commissioner of Social Security, announced. This change restores Wednesday public service hours that were last in place in late 2012. "I don't want someone to come to our office at 2:30 on a Wednesday only to find our doors closed," Commissioner Saul said.

In another move to improve service to the public, Commissioner Saul announced in his Open Letter to the Public at www.ssa.gov/agency/coss-message.html that the agency is hiring 1,100 front line employees to provide service on the agency's National 800 Number and in its processing centers. The agency is currently bringing onboard 100 new processing center employees and approximately 500 new teleservice representatives for the 800 Number. An additional 500 hires for the 800 Number will occur later in 2020.

"Improving service is my top priority. Increasing full public service hours at our nationwide network of more than 1,200 field offices is the right thing to do and will provide additional access," Commissioner Saul said. "The hiring of a thousand new employees to provide service through our National 800 Number and an additional 100 hires to process people's Social Security benefits at our processing centers around the country are steps in the right direction in our mission to greatly improve the service we provide."

Currently, a field office is generally open to the public from 9:00 a.m. to Noon on Wednesdays. Beginning on January 8, 2020, offices will remain open until 4:00 p.m. on Wednesdays, with typical field office hours from 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

While the agency continues to improve both the access to and the experience with its services, it is important to note that most Social Security services do not require the public to take time to visit an office. People may create a my Social Security account, a personalized online service, at www.socialsecurity.gov/myaccount.

Through their personal my Social Security account, people can check personal information and conduct business with Social Security. If they already receive Social Security benefits, they can start or change direct deposit online, and if they need proof of their benefits, they can print or download a current Benefit Verification Letter from their account.

People not yet receiving benefits can use their online account to get a personalized Social Security Statement, which provides earnings history information as well as estimates of future benefits. Currently, residents in 40 states and the District of Columbia may request a replacement Social Security card online if they meet certain requirements. The portal also includes a retirement calculator and links to information about other online services, such as applications for retirement, disability, and Medicare benefits.

Many Social Security services are also conveniently available by dialing toll-free, 1-800-772-1213. People who are deaf or hard of hearing may call Social Security's TTY number, 1-800-325-0778.



Minutes: Motion by Willoughby to approve the minutes from November 11, 2019. Supported by Townsend. All in favor. Motion carried.

Treasurer's Report: Motion by Conklin to accept the treasurer's report. Supported by Townsend. All in Favor. Motion carried.

Approval of bills: Motion by Willoughby to pay the November bills in the amount of \$94,500.56 using checks # 27646-27683 and e-checks #430-435. Supported by Conklin. All in favor. Motion carried. Motion by Willoughby to disburse payroll and related payroll expenses for November 2019 in the amount of \$5929.17. using checks #12402-12409. Supported by Conklin. All in favor. Motion carried.

Reports:

County Commissioner Adam Stacey spoke about the latest plan to fund the needed 911 emergency operation upgrades. They are proposing a .85 millage to fund it. This would be the first county millage in over a generation and a half.

Victor Township Planning Commission member; Kim Dutcher provided on the survey they mailed out with the tax bills. So far 121 surveys have been returned. He also noted planning commission meetings will continue to be held on the first Monday of each month, but will now begin at 7:15.

LSW: Minutes from October 16, 2019 meeting and the October 2019 activity report were reviewed.

Maintenance & Facilities: Clery Fence plans to install fence the week of December 9, 2019. Lenon Electric plans to begin installing new lighting in the firehall conference room and garage the week of December 30, 2019. Fire trucks will need to be moved out. Arrangements for that will be made between LSW and Lenon Electric. Motion by Willoughby to pay \$3200.00 deposit to Lenon Electric and \$1450.00 to Clery Fence. Supported by Townsend. All in favor. Motion carried.

Items of Public Interest: Tax Bills In 2017 the voters passed the EMS millage – this millage replaces the "Fire" millage. The amounts are the same 1.5. Neither millage was charged to residents last year in an effort to spend the "Fire" funds in the account. The Township Board voted to charge the millage this year. The only difference between the fire millage and the EMS millage is that the Fire millage could be used ONLY on FIRE Protection and the EMS millage can be used on emergency services rather than limiting it to FIRE only.

Correspondence: A letter from a resident regarding her interaction with Lansing Mercy Ambulance Service was reviewed and placed on file.

Unfinished Business:

1. Security System – Print Makers Service Inc attended the meeting to answer some questions regarding their quote. Office Administrator< Melanie McIntosh and Trustee Mike Wall will begin work on the Security RFP in December.
2. Policy & Procedures – Amendments were received by Trustee Townsend. Conklin will redraft and furnish to the Board at the January meeting.
3. Parking lot has been 100% completed
4. Ordinance 19.3 Fire, Ambulance & Inhalator Service Charges Ordinance – Township Attorney David Revore addressed the Board regarding the ongoing disorganization of the ordinances. It was suggested the board consider entering into contract with a company specialized in assisting with the organization of ordinances. Revore and Willoughby will review all of the fire and emergency services ordinances and work to draft one single ordinance to encompass all that currently exist.
5. Janitorial Services – Supervisor Malkin reported floors are not being properly mopped and parking lot trash can have not been emptied. Due to the weather and the can being uncovered it will be removed and placed in the pavilion concession stand for winter. Conklin will notify custodian of the mopping issues.

There are those who would argue that recycling will do nothing to stop the tsunami of climate change that has already begun. The rest of our waste – \$435 million worth of reusable materials annually – goes straight into a landfill. You can help turn that around. If you aren't already recycling, please start now. Don't worry about going the whole nine yards right away; start with one thing, then another, and another. We're glad to help—to answer your questions, steer you in the right direction, and empty your vehicle when you bring your stuff. When you recycle, you'll find you're part of a large community of others who also care.

Recycling drives are held the second Saturday of each month (as they have been for 30 years now). Barring a blizzard

or below-10-degrees weather, the next one will be on Sat., Jan. 11 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. in downtown Laingsburg. We hope you'll be there.

Materials accepted every month include newspaper and phone books, glass containers for food and beverage, tin and aluminum (can be mixed), scrap metal, electronics (no CRT monitors), corrugated cardboard and boxboard (include brown paper bags here), mixed office paper (no adhesives), books, magazines, and plastics #1-7 (please separate them into #1's, clear #2's, colored #2's, and #3-7 and keep lids separate). Household batteries continue to be accepted as well; please separate into regular, lithium, and rechargeables. Note: the GLR cannot accept plastic grocery bags or polystyrene/Styrofoam (this item is accepted at the St. Johns Lions', Meridian Twp. and East Lansing sites).

As always, recyclers from any community are welcome. A \$2-\$3 donation to help cover our costs is requested but not mandatory.
