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102nd Year Celebration Ola Holiness Camp


Mark your calendars for the 102nd Ola Holiness Camp celebration starting June 21st thru June 28th.

Rep. Frederick Nominated to Serve on Michigan Workforce Development Board

State Rep. Ben Frederick today was nominated by the Speaker of the House to serve on the newly formed Michigan Workforce Development Board.

The board, established by the governor on May 29, will be responsible for the development and continuous improvement of the workforce development system in Michigan. The board will help develop, implement and maintain the four-year state workforce development plan required to continue receiving funds from the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act.

“I’m incredibly excited to have an opportunity to join together with a group of people who share my passion for helping others gain the skills they need to lead successful careers,” said Frederick, of Owosso. “Workforce training programs and educational opportunities help remove barriers and give hard-working Michiganders a chance to improve their lives.”

The board also is tasked with helping the governor advance her goal of helping 60% of Michigan’s workforce achieve a post-secondary degree or certification by 2030.

Prior to his nomination, Frederick authored the bipartisan ReConnect Initiative to support adult learners seeking degrees and credentials and also served as chairman of the House Workforce and Talent Development Committee.

Movies in the Park, Pancake Breakfast are Newest Events 'On Hold' Due to COVID-19

LAINGSBURG — The Laingsburg City Council is taking a “wait and see” approach toward holding the bulk of the city’s summer events.

Monday, June 1, the council voted unanimously to cancel Music and Movies in the Park, as well as the Laingsburg Business and Community Association’s annual pancake breakfast, due to health and safety concerns surrounding COVID-19. The council will re-evaluate the status of each event in August.

“We wanted to cancel now so that the public is clear in the communication, they know that they’re not going to have it (at this point),” council member Brian Fredline said. “If circumstances change in August, at our August meeting we could (certainly) turn it back on again, based on the (Michigan) Department of Health and Human Services and CDC guidelines (at that time).”

The Laingsburg Farmers Market, meanwhile, was given the green light Monday, as council members voted 6-0 to allow it to open along Roosevelt Row June 10, with social distancing measures in place.

Council members cited the ability to easily separate vendors and the Department of Health and Human Services’ current guidelines surrounding markets as reasons for allowing Laingsburg’s operation to move forward.

“I do think our farmers market has struggled,” Laingsburg council member Gail Geasler said, “And if we don’t open it this year, then people are going to start going to other farmers markets.”

Beginning June 10, the Laingsburg Farmers Market will be from 4 to 7 p.m. Wednesdays along Roosevelt Row, with a tentative final market date of Oct. 21, according to Market Manager Dena Judd.

In a Facebook post Tuesday, Judd outlined a number of safety precautions vendors will be taking to ensure customer safety. “All vendors will be at a safe distance, masked, and sanitizing after each customer,” Judd said in the post. “We will be bagging items for you and may instill the ‘you touch, you buy’ method, if necessary.”

Music and Movies in the Park, a summer series that spans July and August in McClintock Park and was slated to begin July 8, is now on hold, though council members indicated they will reevaluate the possibility of the city holding those events during their Aug. 3 council meeting.

“We could certainly have a quick turnaround if the council decides in August that things are better and we want to do something,” Movies in the Park organizer Jody Frank said.

Geasler, who helps coordinate the music side of things, expressed a similar sentiment.

“If things change and turn around and we decide we want to do something later this summer, we would (certainly) be able to get a band,” Geasler said. “I would like to look at it again in August. I could see where maybe if things turn around we might be able to have one.”

The Laingsburg Business and Community Association’s annual pancake breakfast — originally scheduled for July 25 — will also be reconsidered by the council Aug. 3. The event generally draws more than 2,000 people downtown, according to City Clerk/Treasurer Paula Willoughby.

The Tri-County Office on Aging to Offer Online Workshops

Lansing - The Tri-County Office on Aging (TCOA) has promoted the independence and dignity of older adults for more than 45 years as the Area Agency on Aging for Clinton, Eaton, and Ingham Counties. TCOA's priority is to keep all volunteers, staff, clients, and program participants safe while continuing to provide a variety of services such as information and assistance, coordination of in-home supports, and health and wellness workshops. TCOA generally offers five evidence-based programs to meet the needs of older adults, their families and caregivers. The agency is pleased to announce the availability of online workshops for three of its most popular programs.

The five programs usually offered are: Diabetes PATH (Personal Action Toward Health), Chronic Pain PATH, A Matter of Balance: Managing Concerns about Falls, Powerful Tools for Caregivers and Creating Confident Caregivers®. All programs are provided at no cost to the participant, have trained facilitators, and come with the materials needed to participate. Under Michigan's Stay Home Stay Safe order, and in following advice from public health officials who recommend that people avoid group settings (especially older adults and individuals with chronic health conditions), TCOA temporarily suspended in-person evidence-based programs in mid-March. TCOA's capable and resilient staff were able to shift Diabetes PATH and Powerful Tools for Caregivers workshops to an online format in order to complete the remaining sessions. New sessions of both, plus an added Chronic Pain PATH workshop are now launching for a 100% remote format. All sessions include a pre-workshop orientation to help participants become familiar with the workshop expectations and gain familiarity with the online format.

Powerful Tools for Caregivers is an interactive workshop designed to help family caregivers take better care of themselves while caring for a family member or friend. This program will give the family caregiver tools to help reduce stress and guilt, communicate effectively, take care of yourself, and much more! This program is not intended for professional caregivers. The session will run on Wednesdays beginning June 17 through July 22, 2020 from 2:30 – 4:00 pm. The Pre-workshop Zoom orientation will be held Wednesday, June 10 at 2:30 pm.

Chronic Pain PATH is designed for individuals with chronic pain. In this virtual workshop, participants are taught effective tools to better self-manage their condition and its impact on their life. A variety of topics are addressed, including fatigue management, dealing with difficult emotions, and pacing & planning. It also includes the Moving Easy Program: safe exercises to improve strength, flexibility, and endurance. The session will run on Wednesdays beginning June 10 through July 15, 2020 from 10:00 am – 12 noon. The Pre-workshop Zoom orientation will be held Wednesday, June 3 at 10:00 am.

Diabetes PATH is designed for people with diabetes or pre-diabetes. The workshop includes diabetes education in an interactive style. Participants are taught effective tools to better self-manage their condition and its impact on their life. The session will run on Mondays beginning July 13 through August 17, 2020 from 1:00 – 3:00 pm. The pre-workshop Zoom orientation will be held Monday, July 6 at 1:00 pm

From a participant who started a Diabetes PATH workshop in person and completed the workshop remotely, "Given the COVID-19 pandemic, I am impressed at the decision to carry on telephonically. The course content remained valid and the slower pace of working from home proved beneficial to applying the principles discussed. More often than not I found myself mindful of my actions and behaviors which improved my blood sugar levels and fell an average of 25 points." From a Powerful tools participant who transitioned online, "I can't imagine making the class any better! The leaders were incredible in their gentle yet 'real' way of presenting and listening. To find ways to continue our class during the pandemic is remarkable. The class was a 'calm' in the storm—especially as we went into quarantine."

Notes TCOA Executive Director Marion Owen, "I have been proud of all of our staff for their hard work and commitment to meeting the needs of our clients and their families. Christine (Histed) has been proactive and is a leader among her peers in helping to restart these workshops because we know how valuable they are to the participants."

Safety Renovations for Senior's Homes

Feeling safe and secure at home is a priority for any homeowner. But safety is of particular concern for aging men and women who are at greater risk of being involved in accidents at home than younger men and women.

As people age, their balance, eyesight and general physical abilities can begin to diminish. Furthermore, a fall or incident that may only bruise a younger individual can cause more serious breaks or damage for seniors, resulting in potentially lengthy recovery times.

Falls: One out of every three seniors aged 65 and older falls at least once a year.

In addition to working with doctors to improve mobility and modify medications that may cause unsteadiness, changes around the home can help. Grab bars placed in bathrooms and high-traffic areas can help seniors get stay more stable when changing from sitting to standing positions.

Potential tripping hazards should be assessed. Area rugs without nonskid backings, clutter on floors, extension cords that extend into walking areas, and uneven flooring pose tripping hazards. Anti-slip coatings can be added to floors to reduce the risk of tripping.

Poorly lit staircases and entryways also can contribute to falls. Consider the installation of motion-activated lighting so that dim areas can be automatically brightened when necessary. A nightlight or LED lights placed near molding can help guide seniors to the bathroom during midnight visits.

Physical limitations: Arthritis can impede seniors' ability to turn on and off appliances, water faucets or handle certain kitchen tools. Kitchen and bathroom modifications can include the installation of ergonomic and user-friendly handles and spigots.

Task lighting can make it easier to prepare meals, and appliances that automatically turn off after a certain period of time can be a safety feature for forgetful individuals. Reorganize kitchen cabinets to make commonly used items as accessible as possible.

Laingsburg Man takes on The Sheik in the Wrestling Ring

LAINGSBURG -- Those of you who have not joined the Laingsburg Historical Page on Facebook are missing some priceless -- sometimes humorous -- history.

Even the Bigford family is getting a chuckle out of a story that appeared on the front page of the 'B' section in the Lansing State Journal on December 27, 1963.

Those of us who grew up in mid-Michigan remember the days of weekend wrestling shows on local TV. Make no mistake: these were the grassroots of what became the mega-millions sports industry that the WWE, WWF, and others wrestling leagues are today.

The personalities and their names are legendary. Bobo Brazil and the Coco-Butt. Killer Tim Brooks. Abdullah The Butcher. Flying Fred Curry. Dick The Bruiser. Haystacks Calhoun. The Stomper. Mighty Igor.

But the most famous around this area was The Sheik.

Sheik Farhat, Sr. was a graduate of St. Mary’s High School in Lansing and debuted on the professional wrestling circuit in 1949, wrestling nearly 50 years into the '90s. His signature finishing moves included the Armpit Claw and the Camel Clutch. Famous for his signature Fireball, he spewed fire into the face of opponents, and was also famous for his Gorilla Press Powerslam.

Sheik was respected by his peers as a pioneer of professional wrestling who conceptualized, revolutionized and made popular his hardcore style. He was a NWA United States Heavyweight Champion, WWF United States Champion, WWA World Martial Arts Heavyweight Champion, ICW United States Heavyweight Champion, NWA Americas Heavyweight Champion, a Cauliflower Allen Club Honoree – 1995 and was inducted into the the Professional Wrestling Hall of Fame in 2011.

Perhaps his most famous altercation -- at least locally -- was when he went "up against" Laingsburg's Albert Bigford, Sr. at Christmastime, 1963.

Here is how the Lansing State Journal reported the story:

OBJECTS TO SHEIK: WRESTLING FAN HURT AT BOUT

"He was an unwilling participant in an impromptu wrestling bout with Sheik Farhat, a 51-year-old Laingsburg man told Lansing police detectives Thursday night.

"Albert W. Bigford, interviewed by officers as he was being treated at Sparrow Hospital for a cut on his little finger and shoulder bruises, said he received the injuries at the Civic Center while watching the professional wrestling matches.

"(The Sheik), always the villain, had completed his match -- 'in which he was nasty as usual' -- and was walking toward the dressing room, according to the police report.

"Farhat became involved in an argument with some spectators and was swinging his fist at them, Bigford said, adding that the Sheik struck him on the shoulder, knocking him to the floor and causing his injuries.

"The injured man told officers he wanted to press for prosecution against Farhat. Detectives told him to talk to the prosecutor. The prosecutor, Leo A. Farhat, is the wrestler's cousin."

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

Mulberry Squirrels

May and June are the months for hunting Mulberry Squirrels but not here in Michigan. Being so far north our climatic conditions and the breeding and gestational cycles of squirrels just don't line up right to provide this early season. In the south, May and June provide a spike in squirrel population as the first litters have been born and weaned off and the next breeding season is months away unlike in Michigan when the cycles are almost back to back.

Most squirrels will have already consumed their buried fall harvests of acorns and other nuts and thus will be consuming a lot of soft mass, especially ripening mulberries. Unlike in the north, mulberry trees are a valued hardwood for fence posts and other uses and are cut down at a young age. Thus, a mature mulberry tree tucked away in a lowland producing fruit is somewhat of a rarity and serves as a mega-magnet for squirrels. Find a mulberry tree and leave all your calls at home because Mother Nature will do the calling for you.

Camo is not necessary but a lighter shade of camo will work better than darker patterns used in the fall. Fresh green foliage will conceal far away squirrels so bring along your favorite scattergun for close shots on the ground or around trunks of trees. Or, if you insist on a hunting with a .22, consider a light handling pump or semi-auto loaded with .22 short hollow points. Also, prepare for dealing with annoying mosquitos, black flies, and ticks.

If you are looking for some spring squirrel hunting plan to travel at least six hours because Kentucky is the closest state allowing a season. Other states include; Arkansas, Louisiana, Missouri, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Virginia, Oklahoma, Kansas, and parts of eastern Texas. Some are stand alone seasons for a few weeks and others are the beginning of very long seasons stretching into late February. Plan your squirrel expedition right and possibly bag an out of state turkey or sample some local fishing holes. Spend some time on the internet and visit each game and fish department's website for the above mentioned southern states.
