He founded the business in 2025 on the principle that everyone deserves a supportive place to explore their mental health needs without long waits, stigma or feeling rushed. "If we take care of our Minds, we can handle Matter. I'm here to help you feel supported, informed and understood whether you're managing long standing symptoms or facing something new," explained Rodway.

Robert is an Advanced Practice Registered Nurse (APRN) and Board-Certified Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner (PMHNP-BC). He earned his Associate Degree in Science from Lansing Community College in 2017, his Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Michigan State University in 2019, and his Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) degree in 2024. 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Ovid-Elsie Area Schools Approves New 2026-2031 Strategic Plan

Ovid-Elsie Area Schools is proud to announce the approval of its new 2026–2031 Strategic Plan, designed to help guide the district’s priorities, decision-making, and continued improvement efforts over the next five years.

The Strategic Plan was officially approved by the Ovid-Elsie Board of Education during their April meeting, following months of planning, data review, and stakeholder input.

The process included public surveys, community input opportunities, staff discussions, student feedback sessions, and a full-day strategic planning retreat facilitated by the Michigan Association of School Boards (MASB). A total of 44 participants, including Board of Education members, administrators, staff members, and community representatives, participated in the collaborative planning process.

The new strategic plan establishes a renewed mission for the district:

“To provide the resources and opportunities to empower our students, staff, and community to grow without limits.”

The district also adopted a new vision statement: “Every student is knowledgeable and prepared to navigate the challenges of tomorrow.”

The plan identifies five Strategic Target Areas that will help guide district priorities and continuous improvement efforts:

- Academics & Programs
- Learning Environment & Culture
- Communications & Community Engagement
- Finance & Operations
- Personnel

Specific objectives and measurable action steps were developed within each area to support student achievement, school culture, communication, operational effectiveness, and long-term district sustainability.

As part of the planning process, the district also reviewed demographic, academic, operational, and financial data. One of the significant challenges identified continues to be declining enrollment, which is a challenge currently facing many school districts across Michigan. The strategic plan includes priorities focused on strengthening district programs, communication, student opportunities, and community engagement as part of the district’s long-term efforts to address those challenges and position the district for future success.

Superintendent Mark Horak stated:

“This plan represents the collective voices and perspectives of our students, staff, families, Board of Education, and community members. We are grateful for the tremendous amount of time, feedback, and collaboration that went into this process. The strategic plan will help provide direction and focus as we continue working to create opportunities and success for all Marauders.”

The district will now begin implementation work connected to the plan objectives, including aligning school improvement efforts, district initiatives, budgeting priorities, and long-term planning processes.

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Ovid-Elsie Board of Education An Evening of Annual Actions

ELSIE – The regular meeting of the Ovid-Elsie Board of Education was held Monday, May 18, 2026. It was an evening highlighted by annual actions taken by the board.

Annual action items included the approval of the Michigan High School Athletic Association membership resolution, and the renewal of board policy 51123 to offer School of Choice at Ovid-Elsie Area Schools.

A letter of resignation was received from Madison Jones-Kramer, effective immediately and it was requested that it be read at the board meeting. It was noted that due to ongoing medical issues from a 2024 automobile accident. In addition, due to ongoing concerns regarding the medical leave, she did not believe she would be returning to a safe working environment where she would not feel respected and protected in her role. She thanked those who supported her during this journey.

The Clinton County RESA 2026-2027 general fund operating budget presentation was provided by a video, Rich Koenigskecht, financial office. 2.5% growth in property taxes is anticipated for the 2026-27, a number of grants were outlined that are considered within the budget. They are anticipating an increase in staffing costs, current staffing 205 employees an increase of 42 employees. Fund balances remain healthy. Building updates were outlined, as well. Officials approved the CCRESA General Fund Operating Budget Resolutions, this was the general fund only.

Bill Ehlert, transportation department, presented the annual bus inspection update. 27 Ovid-Elsie, 6 Ashley, and 16 Laingsburg buses were inspected. Ovid-Elsie had all 27 buses pass; Ashley 5 passed and 1 was red tagged noting that the bus was reinspected the next day and is now good to go; and Laingsburg 15 green and 1 red. Overall a very good inspection.

The annual Wellness Committee report was presented to board members and the public. The report highlighted the mission and purpose. A wellness policy is required by USDA to maintain the lunch program. Three focus areas – physical education, health and wellbeing, and nutrition education. A formal assessment is required every three years. Last year's goals – promoting healthy eating habits, wellness resources, and staff wellness. A \$15,000 grant was received from USDA – tasting events were held to get students involved; an elementary fruit and vegetable survey was given, again to get students involved and to participate; and funds are going to be used to spruce up the cafeterias. The goal is to make the cafeteria more inviting. EE Knight is going to be establishing a community garden project, again to get the kiddos involved. Equipment for the middle school for outside during breaks, specifically lunch time. Fund raising initiatives are being evaluated, specifically to limit the food driven types. The goal is to create a culture of community wellness. The website has been updated. Goals for 2026-27 include Wellstat assessment, a focus on

the curriculum and what health classes are teaching, staff wellness, promoting classroom wellness and healthy habits and to increase community engagement.

An Ovid-Elsie Sex Education Advisory Board update was presented to the Ovid-Elsie Board of Education. The new supervisor is Melissa Jones, school nurse, this created a co-chair position. The two-year report was presented. The curriculum for each grade level has been evaluated, noting that parents may review any of the binders. Parents can opt their child out of any or all lessons.

Mr. Mark Horak, superintendent, reported that the following teachers will complete probationary status at the end of the school year: Danielle Cook, middle school special education; Sierra Hudak, elementary school; and Austin Migoski, high school.

In addition, Horak reported that there will be a board work session with administrators Wednesday, June 10, 2026. A school board policy committee has been created and the members are: Sue Greer, Kevin Nash and Becky Williams. He wrapped with a reminder that there will be a finance committee meeting prior to the June regular meeting to review the budget.

Officials took formal action to extend contracts for the following employees: Lynn Eichenberg as a teacher at EE Knight Elementary for the 2026-27 school year and Linda Snelling, also a teacher at EE Knight for the 2026-27 school year.

A lengthy list of NEOLA policies were presented for a first reading, volume 40, number 2. A brief overview – definitions, staff ethics, online/blended learning program, comprehensive school health education, sex education, volunteers, wireless communication devices, purchasing, artificial intelligence, emergency operations plan, specialized transportation for students with IEPs, new school construction, payroll authorization, payroll deductions, and use of social media. No action taken at this time.

Mr. Dan Davenport recommended the purchase of computer hardware and software licenses from CDW-G in the amount of \$162,657.15. This purchase includes 335 Chromebook units, associated Google ChromeOS Education licenses and protective cases. A history of the purchasing of devices was outlined. Noting that prices are going up and fluctuating due to a number of factors and demand is growing. Officials approved the recommendation.

Finally, officials approved the over-night trip request presented by the Ovid-Elsie High School Band. The marching band amp will be held at Lincoln Lake Baptist Camp departing on Monday, July 27, 2026 and returning Friday, July 31, 2026.

Eric Jones commented on his daughter's resignation and thanked specific board members for their support during this challenging time.

Ovid-Elsie Students Tackle Global Hunger at Michigan Youth Institute

EAST LANSING, MI — On May 7th, 2026, the campus of Michigan State University became a hub for the next generation of global changemakers, including a powerful contingent of 35 brilliant minds from Ovid-Elsie High School. These students stepped up to the plate to participate in the prestigious Michigan Youth Institute, a cornerstone event for the World Food Prize Global Challenge. Under the guidance and mentorship of OEHS teacher Dana Blank, the students embarked on a rigorous academic journey aimed at solving one of the world's most pressing issues: food insecurity.

The Road to Becoming Borlaug Scholars

To participate, each student selected a specific country and a complex issue affecting its food security, culminating in an in-depth research essay. These essays weren't just for a class grade—they were submitted to and evaluated by real-world "experts" in the agricultural and humanitarian fields. At the MSU event, the Ovid-Elsie cohort was placed into collaborative groups where they presented their findings and debated solutions with peers from across the state. In recognition of their hard work and innovative ideas, every participating student was awarded the Norman Borlaug Scholar Award. This distinction

not only honors their achievement but also unlocks exclusive future academic and professional opportunities.

"Our students are looking beyond their own backyards to solve massive, real-world problems," said mentor Dana Blank. "The dedication they've shown to understanding global agricultural challenges is truly inspiring."

A Legacy of Excellence

Ovid-Elsie High School is no stranger to success at the World Food Prize. Last year, standout students Madalynn Bushard, Luk Massuch, and Leyton Belill achieved the distinct honor of being named Michigan Delegates. Their selection carried them all the way to the Global Youth Institute for the World Food Prize in Des Moines, Iowa, last October, where they collaborated with youth leaders from around the globe.

The Next Generation of Delegates

Building on previous years' momentum, the momentum at OEHS isn't slowing down. This year, four exceptional Ovid-Elsie students have been selected to interview for the coveted title of Michigan Delegate for the upcoming Global Institute in Iowa. 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Special Board of Education Meeting to Address a Formal Complaint Regarding a Board Member

ELSIE – Members of the Ovid-Elsie Board of Education addressed a formal complain regarding a board member at a special meeting Wednesday, June 3, 2026. Shortly after opening the meeting officials retired in close d session to address information exempt from disclosure under the Freedom of Information Act. The complaints were brought against Board Vice President Sue Greer.

Due to a misunderstanding the district's legal counsel did not arrive until 7pm. Officials retired in closed session shortly after the meeting was called to order, to review the documents that had been received. Officials returned at 7:28p. At which time board members added two actions to items to the agenda- action item Josh Miller, trustee, moved to retain Nichole Hunter to investigate a complaint of retaliation against an employee. The second action item was to retire in a second closed session at 7:30 to discuss a complaint received regarding a board official.

Officials returned in open session at 9:10p. The Board considered two resolutions prepared by Thrun Law Firm, PC. First, a resolution disclaiming the actions and comments made at the May 18, 2026 regular meeting by School Board Vice President Sue Greer. A resolution disclaiming the actions and comments of school board Vice President Sue Greer passed by a unanimous vote.

“Now therefore, be it resolved that: 1) Comments made by Vice President Greer during the May 2026 meeting, concerning a resigning employee, were made by a single member of this board do not represent the position or opinion of the school board as an entity under the Revised School Code. 2) The Ovid-Elsie Area Schools community and its members are hereby placed on notice that unless specifically authorized by motion of this board, an individual member of the school board has no greater authority than that of an individual community member and that such individual's comments and conduct should not be construed as representing the position or opinion of the school board. 3) The school completely, without reservations, disavows the aforementioned comments and conduct as representing the position or opinion of the school board. 4)The school board affirms its commitment to comply with the Revised School Code and all civil rights. 5) The Board's actions within this resolution shall be inserted within the minutes of this meeting. 6) All resolutions and parts of resolutions insofar as they conflict with the provisions of this resolution are hereby rescinded.”

The second resolution, to censure school board vice president Sue Greer was considered but failed – three yes: Brooke Wooley, Dr. David Huff and Josh Miller; descending votes: Kevin Nash, Becky Williams Mary Thompson and Sue Greer. It was noted that Vice President Greer commented about a resigning employee during the May 2026 regular meeting; Board President Wooley independently investigated whether the comments were accurate and supported by evidence, and found that several of the comments were made without evidence to support them and that the comments were not supported or endorsed by the full board and did not reflect the views or considerations of the full board.

In summary the proposed resolution included the following: the Board disavows the comments made by Vice President Greer; noted that Mrs. Greer ignored her special responsibilities as vice president and she failed to monitor or reflect upon the adverse effect of her unauthorized and unsupported comments on the board and district. The resolution recommended the immediate removal of Greer as vice president; and aforementioned comments would be censored. Again, noting that the resolution failed.

Under public comment Mr. Eric Jones appreciated the efforts made by the board.

Yesterday I was at MG's Perx and Pastries until ten. I had to get a lemon meringue pie finished up, Diane had readied the pie shell for me. Her shells are beautiful mine are functional. The filling and meringue turned out well...possibly 'picture perfect'. So it was a pleasure to see, it should also have been delicious. Fortunately I do not get so egotistical about everything that I can do... I got to visit with Margie and Sally when they delivered our eggs and butter, it is humbling when others do for us out of kindness with no expectations. That is a great blessing.

After the shop I zipped home to make up a corn/multi-bean salad for our Sunshine Club meeting at the Bannister park. It was unusual that only one of a dozen ladies made dessert, no doubt the July meeting will be filled with sweets. We enjoyed the dinner rolls, seven different salads, a plate of deviled eggs, two baked beans and smoked sausage in sauerkraut. It was a nice spread. We take turns watering our flower bed to keep it perky, I have the ninth and thirteenth to do the deed. I may not be able to do the deed first thing in the morning but I will get it done.

Now my biggest expectation is getting my rototiller running. That and getting the rest of my garden into the ground, I am looking forward to the fresh veggies (even though when harvesting is in progress) my own garden is extremely weedy. Does that mean that my goals are weed orientated? Be wise, share your smiles and laugh and may God bless you.

The Appalachian Trail: Modernized but still Challenging

The Weekly Sportsman first learned of the 2200 mile Appalachian Trail (AT) that follows the ridgeline of the Appalachian Mountains in middle school while reading numerous articles from issues of Backpacker and American Survival Guide. The concept of a linear park and a hiking trail spanning across 14 states from Georgia to Maine was first proposed in 1921 and completed in 1937. Today over 3 million people traverse some part of the trail and are referred to as segment hikers whereas over 3000 hikers attempt to be thru-hikers with only about 25% being successful with the 5-7 month journey.

Reality has finally set in for the Weekly Sportsman that a thru-hike is going to be just about impossible due to life's restraints and responsibilities, however, segment hiking is a completely different story. There was a time when thru-hikes and segment hikes were very complicated logistically when it came to the coordination of resupply. Today is different from even a decade ago as many parts of the trail aren't so remote and many communities and local residents offer assistance from food to housing to gear. If a group of hikers had a chase vehicle, many nights could be spent in hotels and eating regular high energy food from grocery stores or restaurants.

Last year, the Weekly Sportsman had a chance to walk about ten miles of the trail located in the Cumberland Valley near Carlisle, Pennsylvania which is the lowest and flattest of the entire 2200 mile AT. The Weekly Sportsman spoke with many of the hikers and all were segment hikers and not thru-hikers. Their clean appearance, and light day pack gear carried, clearly indicated that they had a chase vehicle/person helping them. If interested in being a segment hiker or thru-hiker there are a ton of resources available that have been published or available on the internet. The Weekly Sportsman believes that the best and most handy waterproof topo map guides to use are published by National Geographic. Of course the best resource for all things AT is the Appalachian Train Conservancy and can be found at <http://appalachiantrail.org>.

Joe DeShone is attending Michigan State University in the fall to study Engineering. MaKenna Johnston is attending Michigan State University to study Fisheries and Wildlife.

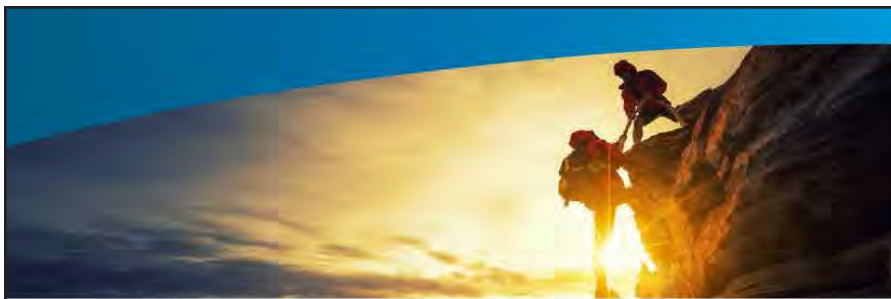


Grace Knull will be attending Michigan State University in the fall to study Supply Chain Management.

"Jack was a competitive coach who cared about winning but cared even more about teaching his players the proper way of playing the game," Foreback says. "He was my junior varsity basketball coach for 30 years and he's been a great friend, a great colleague and a great teacher. The thing about Jack was that he cared a great deal about winning. He tried to win districts and league championships but he didn't have the big number of wins that other coaches sometimes have who get voted into the Hall of Fame. And that's a great accomplishment. Jack was the kind of coach who played his best players in the league games and played the rest of his players in non-league games. He played all of his players. He was competitive because he spent a lot of time in professional baseball."

Coach Nutter -- who mentored coach Loynes as a player at O-E -- compiled a 303-421 career record, which was highlighted by four league championships and two district crowns. He coached 28 years of varsity baseball at the school, beginning in 1972.

Loynes, a standout player himself for Nutter, graduated from O-E in 1994 and went on to play collegiately at Adrian ... before returning to take over the Marauder varsity baseball helm.

Veterans ride free. September 26 is the 25th Anniversary of Clinton Transit. There will be games, rides, food, tours of the facility.
